From the Headmaster's Desk

Dear parents,

Spring is here, and we will soon be celebrating Easter, one of the most important festivals for the followers of Jesus Christ. I have always spent this time pondering the life of Jesus – the hardships he endured as a child, his teachings, ministries, and most importantly, his death and resurrection, for which the Cross has become the most significant symbol of the Christian faith.

While adoring Jesus for his atonement of our sins through his excruciating death on the Cross and his final victory by coming back to life three days later, a lot of us may not see its connection with our lives. After all, it is a two thousand years old story and we can hardly see ourselves making the same level of sacrifice for others.

Indeed, in such a highly competitive society as Hong Kong, many of us have been taught to fight for our fair share or even step on others to succeed. Servanthood or sacrifice for the sake of others is surely not a popular notion. What we witness, however, is a society in which people are alienated from one another — employers seeing their employees as sheer commodities for generating profits, employees putting in extremely long hours at work merely for material gain, and people networking for business rather than making real friends.

However, what Jesus demonstrated on the Cross – compassion and servanthood – is not that distant to us, and if more of us are practising servant leadership in our workplace, at our home and at school, our world will certainly become a better place. Though a Christian for more than 40 years, I got such new understanding of the meaning of the Cross while working as a mentor at a university last year.

In one of the workshops of the mentorship program, the speaker lay on the floor facedown, with his hands fully stretched. Then he asked a few students to walk from one side to the other by stepping on his body. Amazed by the servanthood of the speaker, the students were encouraged to become a bridge so that others could attain success through them. What I saw, on the other hand, was a Cross on the ground, symbolizing our reconciliation with God through Jesus Christ our Saviour. By following Jesus' example of compassion and servanthood in our life, we can also help other people lead a better life.

Such acts of kindness can be as small as holding the door for someone behind you or saying thanks to a cashier at the supermarket. We can share a fruit or a loaf of bread with a homeless person or help a young mother carry the baby stroller down the steps. As a boss, we can be more attuned to the needs of our subordinates. I still remember two days after my older son Jonathan was born, my boss saw me dozing off in my office and quickly 'ordered' me to go home and spend the next few days with my newborn. Even as a subordinate, we can go out of our way to help our coworkers in need rather than work in strict accordance with our job specifications. The family will also be a haven if every member is willing to serve instead of leaving all the chores to the domestic helper or the mother.

May you and your child be enlightened by the Cross this Easter!
