#### Kidnap of Jean Paul Getty's grandson By Haden Lam (WTE4A)

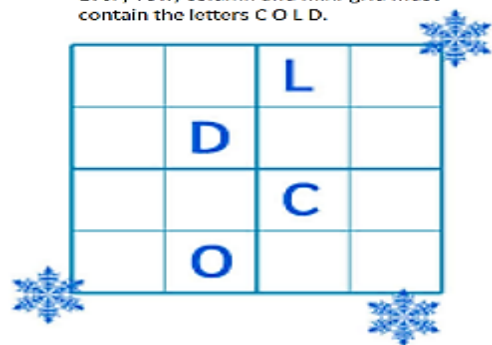
**Grandson:** Where am I? It is too dark in here!
