#### From the Headmaster's Desk

"You are told to love your neighbour as yourself. How do you love yourself? When I look into my own mind, I find that I do not love myself by thinking myself a dear old chap or having affectionate feelings. I do not think that I love myself because I am particularly good, but just because I am myself and guite apart from my character. I might detest something which I have done. Nevertheless, I do not cease to love myself. In other words, that definite distinction that Christians make between hating sin and loving the sinner is one that you have been making in your own case since you were born. You dislike what you have done, but you don't cease to love yourself. You may even think that you ought to be hanged. You may even think that you ought to go to the Police and own up and be hanged. Love is not affectionate feeling, but a steady wish for the loved person's ultimate good as far as it can be obtained."

Dear parents,

I just had my first dose of COVID-19 vaccination early this month. In urging us to take the injection, the senior pastor of our church said it is the best way to 'love your neighbour' despite all the scepticism, fears and risks involved. But who is my neighbour? Why should I love the person who hasn't got anything to do with my life?

For most of us, it is far easier to love our family and friends as ourselves. Most probably, we do it out of reciprocity – we love as we have been loved. There is also a certain level of fondness among us, therefore we don't want to cause any possible harm to one another.

However, when Jesus told the parable of the Good Samaritan to illustrate the true meaning of a neighbour, he didn't even mean the neighbours who live next door to us, although many of us might not even know our neighbours' names. In the story, the person who got robbed was a complete stranger to the Samaritan who simply happened to pass by. Moved by compassion, he dressed and even settled the hotel bills of the wounded who was stripped of all his belongings.

With the above story in mind, we could even say we must love any stranger in need of help. It is driven by benevolence that has nothing to do with fondness. This indeed echoes the definition of love by Lewis – 'it is not an affectionate feeling but a wish for the loved person's ultimate good.' The person's wellbeing is the end in itself; the person who loves is not seeking any reciprocation or recognition.

Finding it extremely difficult to love a complete stranger or even someone we hate? That is exactly why Jesus told us to love others as ourselves because most of us love ourselves irrespective of how we evaluate ourselves. We feed ourselves when we feel hungry, clothe ourselves when we feel cold and seek physical comfort as much as we can. In a word, our love for ourselves is absolutely unconditional – the ultimate good of ourselves is always our highest priority although we may detest some of our own behaviour.

Personally, I can easily show compassion to the poor and underprivileged who are in need but find it challenging to love those people whose mindsets and acts I loathe – totalitarian authorities that disregard life and human rights, social control agents like the police who abuse their power, and corrupt politicians who seek their interests rather than the greater good of the country. I despise their deeds but will continue to love them, that is to wish for their 'ultimate good'.

Let us truly love our neighbour the way we excuse, forgive and pamper ourselves to make our city a genuinely caring community. There are surely many more ways to express such love besides getting the jab.

The Father and the Son by Tristan Chen (WTE 2A)


Once upon a time, there were a father and his son. The father went farming in his field, and the son sat on the couch every day.
