From the Headmaster's Desk

"That is the thankless position of the father in the family — the provider for all, and the enemy of all." ~ J. August Strindberg

Dear parents,

We are celebrating Father's Day on the third Sunday of this month, but our society, like most others, has been a bit 'unfair' to fathers. While flower prices skyrocket, Mother's Day's collections outsell all other items in shops, and restaurants get fully booked on Mother's Day, the celebrations for Father's Day remain much more lukewarm and subdued.

Understandably, many fathers would empathize with August Strindberg, the renowned American writer of the 19th century, that while being the provider, the father is the enemy of everyone in the family. But why would a provider become the enemy of everyone in the family? Why would his loved ones turn their backs on someone who toils to make them live comfortably? Does it mean that material provision isn't the key to love and respect?

For centuries in countries where male chauvinism prevailed, men would assume the role of a provider in the family. Most men learnt the men code from their fathers that men had to work hard, bear all the pain but never show it to the family. This mentality hasn't really changed when the two genders have become more equal over the past few decades during which women have also become more active in the workforce. An archetype father works long hours, talks little at home and resorts to electronic games, drinks or fun times with friends to release work stress.

On the other hand, women, working or not, are often expected to be the nurturer in the family. Generally more affectionate and vocal than the father, a typical mother spends more time playing and talking with her children than a father does. She may tutor her children on their schoolwork and arrange their extra-curricular classes and activities. I can attest to it as at E-Smart, I always meet the parent or guardian after assessing the English ability of a new student, and most of the time, I meet the mother rather than the father.

Conceivably, while a child may quietly look up to her father who works hard to provide for the family, she will definitely become closer to the one who spends time talking and playing with her. However, as a child grows, parents often find themselves less of a nurturer or a disciplinarian and become more a mentor and guide for their children until they are fully grown and live on their own. The strong emotional support a child gets from the parents will make her feel secure to seek advice from both parents when faced with life choices and difficulties. While a child may prefer the mother for consultation on relationship issues, research has shown

that the father is often the choice for advice on decisions about studies and careers.

Indeed, fathers of modern times may have a lot to catch up on becoming more affectionate and expressive of their love so that their kids can become emotionally strong and confident, a quality far more important for success in life than being well-endowed. On the other hand, the mother, the nurturer of the family, should constantly acknowledge the contributions of the father and help her kids to love and respect their provider, which will in turn foster their love for the mother.
